

Kiwi Woggle Default Rules

The following rules are those accepted at the Leaders Council at Gympie (June 1990) with alterations and amendments to suit the staging of Kiwi Woggle by Beaver Masters District, and further alterations and amendments (as an attachment) to suit the staging of Kiwi Woggle by D'Aguilar Range District in 2002. These should be read in conjunction with the local rules and any further amendments or additions decided upon by the Leaders Council after Kiwi Woggle 2002.

By unanimous vote a notice of motion was passed at the Leaders meeting at Kiwi Woggle 2005, held at Rocky Creek Campsite, Beaver Masters District, to replace the word 'unanimous' in Rule 1, with the word 'majority'.

The following rules are those adopted at the Leaders Council at Wyper Park (April 2013) with alterations and amendments for future Kiwi Woggles. These amendments were made to ensure the longevity of Kiwi Woggle. These rules should be read in conjunction with the Local Rules.

1. **The Host District is responsible for:**

The holding of a special Leaders Council during the Camp. This meeting shall be held on Sunday Night. The time and place must be advised to all participating Districts. Each District shall have one (1) vote. Proxy votes are allowed. All disagreements, suggestions and guideline alterations may only be changed by resolution at the Leaders Council and by majority vote of the District Delegates.

2. **The Host District shall ensure:**

- 2.1 Camp fees are kept to a minimum.
- 2.2 Every participating Group is advised well in advance of the General Rules, Entry Conditions, Competition Guidelines and Camp Theme(s) as decided by the Host District.
- 2.3 The camp emphasis is placed on Good Scouting Standards, Friendship, Good Sportsmanship, Camping Expertise and Patrol Participation.
- 2.4 Alcohol is not permitted on site. Other arrangements can be made should a Leader's social function be indicated on the program. Should such a function be planned off-site, Camp Security must be of a high standard during the absence of Leaders.
- 2.5 Overall camp Security is of a high standard. Sub-Camp Leaders and approved Assistants will be responsible for Security in Sub-Camps under their control. Selected Security Teams for general purposes are to be provided in addition to Sub-Camp arrangements.
- 2.6 That an organisational structure of a high standard is provided for all categories in the camp management. Such a structure will be controlled by the host District Commissioner in conjunction with a nominated Camp Chief, Sub-Camp Leaders, Judges, Activity Co-ordinators and Patrol Leaders.
- 2.7 Sick parades are held frequently under the control of Sub-Camp Leaders at their discretion, but preferably morning and afternoon.
- 2.8 All attending Leaders of any rank will be allowed to camp individually in allocated areas under private tentage or similar and / or in accommodation provided by the host. Leaders may not camp with their patrols. This included chaperones for female youth members. Female Leaders will be available for the duration of the camp, as per P&R and QBSI.
- 2.9 Leaders delegated to Sub-Camp control must camp at the Sub-Camp either privately or in accommodation, if supplied.
- 2.10 That all attending Leaders of any rank be given the opportunity to be a member of the organisational structure and to assist wherever necessary in the running and organising of any activity.

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- 2.11 All awards and trophies, as applicable, be made available for display on arrival in camp on the first day by the Host District. Traditional handovers will be performed on Opening parade. Awards and presentations should be given on Final Parade. In the case of a special event award, the award should be presented immediately following the event.
- 2.12 All Patrol sites be advised on arrival in camp for off-loading of equipment and erection of temporary accommodation if necessary.
- 2.13 All vehicles, excluding service transport, be parked in special areas away from general camping areas, and use of same be banned during the camp within the camping zone.
- 2.14 The holding of a Main Parade and Sub-Camp Parade as per the set program. Their content and membership, and the standard of dress as notified by Camp Headquarters or Sub-Camp Leaders.
- 2.15 That any Patrol outside the defined Kiwi Woggle Host Area is able to participate in the competition guidelines and grading.
- 2.15a That the Kiwi Woggle and Kiwi will be held by the host district. The winning patrol will receive a plaque or trophy to be determined by the host district.
- 2.16 Every Scout must be given equal opportunity to participate. Genuine Patrols must be given top priority in attendance, however, in some instances this requirement has to be waived under special circumstances. That inexperienced patrols have leader assistance as required. Ad Hoc Patrols are permitted and Leaders must advise whether they have enrolled Ad Hoc Patrols or not, preferably on application forms. Ad Hoc Patrols duly registered are not penalised. Unregistered Ad Hoc Patrols will be penalised. This is a matter of trust between Leaders and Organisers, and helps in eliminating the practice of handpicked patrols.
- 2.17 That adequate facilities are provided according to local government requirements.
- 2.18 That all participating Patrols are aware of fire regulations and the type of cooking fires to be used during the duration of the camp as set by the Host District.
- 2.19 All tent poles and construction timber should be provided by the participating patrol except where specific requests are indicated in advance. In all cases, such equipment must adhere to rules as set by the Host District for the competition. Prefab tabletops are acceptable if the competition requires same. Prefab construction may only be used when stipulated.
- 2.20 That advice be given well in advance as to the type of cooking to be experienced – Patrol or bulk catering. In both cases, suitable storage containers must be provided for refrigerated and perishable goods. Daily supplies as in bulk catering would be issued from a QM Store, having been ordered in advance.
- 2.21 That tentage for the competition shall be Patrol size tents, under normal circumstances. Because of the use of hike tents and aluminium-framed tents for lightweight, these tents are acceptable only if organisers are advised of same.
- 2.22 The use of either style tent does not eliminate the erection of dining fly etc. unless stated otherwise by the Host District.
- 2.23 That souvenirs and badges be kept in good taste. A Badge of high quality is required annually to commemorate the event.
- 2.24 That adequate media coverage is given and local VIP's are invited to attend.
- 2.25 That correct Camping permits are obtained.
- 2.26 At Closing Parade the Host District shall pass the Kiwi Woggle Flag to the next Hosting District who will caretake until the next Kiwi Woggle.

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3. Competition Guidelines.

- 3.1 The Host District will set the theme and rules applicable to the camp competition each year and all participating patrols must be advised well in advance for planning purposes.
- 3.2 The Campsite competition will commence on the first day and immediately following Opening Parade for which full uniform is to be worn.
- 3.3 The time period for the competition will be set by the Host District according to the theme of the Camp.
- 3.4 Leaders may not assist any patrol in any way or form during the competition. It is pointed out that all patrols should participate as a skills training event. The Kiwi Woggle is traditionally a camping skills event and tradition should be adhered to.
- 3.5 The Host District shall appoint a Judging team, by October of the year prior to the next Kiwi Woggle, of which the minimum number shall be three (3) plus a Chief Judge. Judges may not be Sub-Camp leaders or leaders associated with any patrols taking part in the competition, except in an extreme emergency and approval by the Camp Chief and Staff.
- 3.6 The Judges decision is final.
- 3.7 Wherever possible, each patrol participating in the competition should receive a copy of their judging sheets at the end of the camp, or as soon as possible.
- 3.8 The Kiwi Woggle Trophy shall be presented to the overall winning patrol on points gained during the competition.
 - 3.8.1 The Kiwi Trophy is for the 2nd place patrol.
 - 3.8.2 Host Districts may add additional prizes.
- 3.9 Points judging in all areas of the competition shall be on a patrol basis except where averaging of points or individual efforts has to be taken into account.
- 3.10 Grading certificates shall be presented to all participating patrols to show the camping standards achieved.
- 3.11 The grades are as follows:

A Grade:	80% or more of the total points allocated.
B Grade:	65-79% of the total points allocated.
C Grade:	50-64% of the total points allocated.

All patrols not gaining 50% will receive a Certificate of Participation.
- 3.12 The Host District may elect to present additional trophies as seen fit in the spirit of the competition. Consideration should be given to campfires, patrol encouragement, gateways and activities. Individual awards are discouraged. All awards should be on a patrol basis.
- 3.13 Five (5) mandatory activities – patrol oriented – must be included within the overall program and allocated points will be credited to the competition judging. The Host District shall decide the format of these special competition activities. Prior advice does not have to be divulged in advance, however, advice of required equipment should be given in advance.
- 3.14 Mandatory activities should be based on Scouting or educational skills.
- 3.15 Alterations, amendments and additions decided upon at the Leaders Council at the camp automatically come into effect at the conclusion of the same camp in preparation for the next venue and Host District.

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- 3.16. The competition shall consist of an overall total point's score of 1000 points, and allocated as shown below. The points shown are maximum accumulated scores permitted under each section. The content of judging scores under each section is at the Host District discretion. Sections may be combined for convenience, but the total score shall not exceed that allocated if judged separately.

Points Allocation:

Overall Presentation:	Layouts, facilities and workability	250
Camp Safety:	Facilities Construction Fire Prevention Equipment, Storage and Maintenance First Aid	250
Hygiene:	Cleanliness – Camp and Personal Catering, Menus, Meal Presentation Cooking Facilities Spare Time and Wet Weather Provisions	250
Morale and Activities:	Patrolmanship, Sportsmanship Patrol Identification Good Turns, Friendliness, Attitude Mandatory Activities, Other Activities.	250

4. The Host District is determined two (2) years in advance at the Leaders Council. Nominations are to be given at that meeting and voted upon by District Delegates (one delegate from each District i.e. 7 delegates).
5. The following rotational Roster was moved and carried at the Leaders Meeting at Kiwi Woggle 2002 and will commence from Kiwi Woggle 2003. Amended at Wyper Park to appoint Gympie District 2014, Fraser District 2015, Nambour District 2016.

The next host district will provide a flyer promoting the next Kiwi Woggle and this information is to be distributed to ALL Leaders and Patrol Leaders at the current Kiwi Woggle, including the theme for the next event.

6. That the delegates meeting which will be held in or close to October in the year prior to Kiwi Woggle. It will be called by the host district or a representative if not delegate.
